Yes. Clinical trials include a defined treatment plan and regular evaluations. The specific care you receive depends on the individual study, but participant safety remains the highest priority.

Will I definitely receive the new treatment?

Not always.

Some studies compare an investigational treatment with another treatment or an inactive comparator to help researchers understand how well the therapy works. The design of each study is explained during the informed consent process.

Can I leave the study?

Absolutely.

Participation is completely voluntary, and you may withdraw from a clinical trial at any time without affecting your ongoing medical care.
